

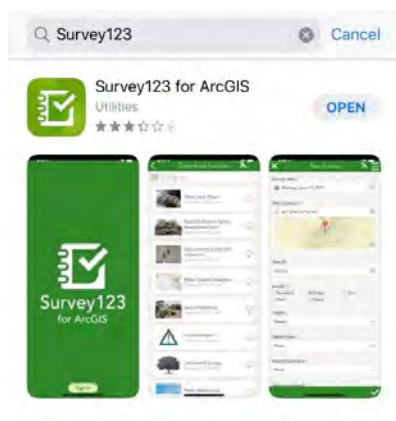
How many Black-Cockatoos have you got at your place?



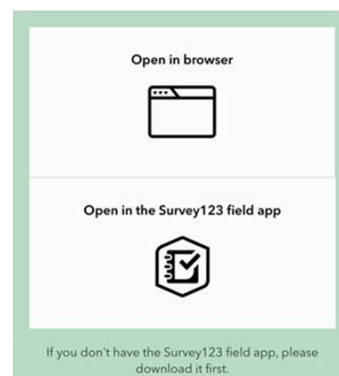
We are asking community members to report their sightings using a simple smart device application. This will enable us to identify their nesting, foraging and roosting sites and work to protect them so that each year the mating pairs can return to breed. They visit the Wheatbelt between July and March, so we're trying to get as many sightings recorded before they leave again.

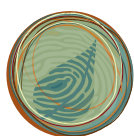
